The Steering Committee

The Biblical Charity Continuing Education Steering Committee was established in 1990 through an endowment. - Provide a viable solution to a real need;
- Hold potential for long-range benefits;
- Test concepts and program that others can learn from or replicate;
- Evidence a commitment to evaluation and accountability.
